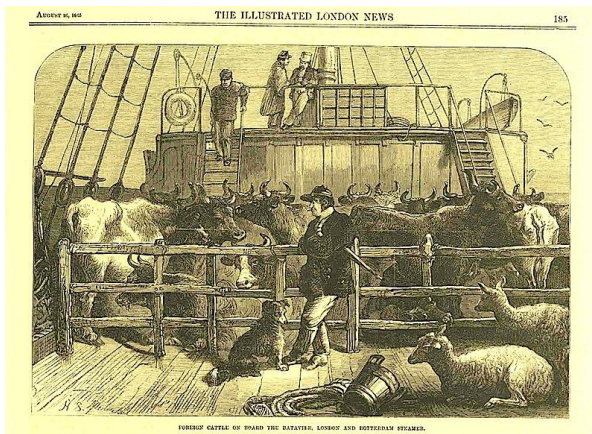

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May 29 Webinar: Rinderpest 160 Years Later

Membership Committee Chair Dr. Helen Wojcinski (helenwojcinski@gmail.com) cordially invites all AVMHS members, their colleagues, and friends to join a special webinar on Thursday, May 29, 2025, at 8 pm EDT (5 pm PT) via Zoom videoconferencing.

In this 30-40 minute virtual presentation, Membership Committee member Dr. Justin Kastner (jkastner@ksu.edu) will present his research titled, “160

Years Later: Rinderpest’s Arrival into Great Britain.” It coincides with the actual May 29, 1865 date of the arrival of rinderpest (the so-called cattle plague) into England, which was a devastating event for British livestock owners.

On the faculty of Kansas State University College of Veterinary Medicine, Dr. Kastner’s talk is part of AVMHS’s spring membership appeal. One of the Committee’s goals is to host webinars both to engage current Society members and to attract new members.

We encourage our members to “invite a friend” to join the webinar, such as someone who may be interested in veterinary history and might become a member. The Zoom invitation link will be sent prior to the webinar.

Dr. Becker to be 2025 Annual Mtg. Speaker

Becker, DVM, PhD, will be the guest speaker at this year’s AVMHS Annual Meeting. Dr. Becker will talk on a topic related to the history of One Health in veterinary medicine. Dr. Becker, a USDA veterinarian, was mentored by Dr. James Steele, who is regarded as the father of One Health. No date has been confirmed for the program and business meeting.

We will also be able to benefit from AASLH's educational publications, webinars, and other resources.

Historical Exhibits in a Practice Hospital

Past President Dr. Pat Kennedy Arrington (bestvet71@aol.com) has been actively involved with enlarging her 24/7 practice's building on the Outer Loop in Louisville, Kentucky. Part of the expansion included display space for historical veterinary instruments and memorabilia.

With construction now winding down, she has shared some pictures of framed memorabilia and exquisite exhibit cases at the Jefferson Animal Hospital. (see page 10) The longest 50-foot case is located in the staff area, but other displays are visible in the public reception area for client browsing and education. A free-standing case has also been assembled at the Fern Creek office.

Dr. Arrington will be posting a slide show on the practice website (<https://jeffersonanimalhospitals.com/>) under "Resources." A link has been made to the AVMHS website, and we will be adding a link to the Jefferson Animal Hospital site on our museums and exhibits page.

She also encourages other practices, especially heritage practices more than 50 years old, to display any number of historical materials, such as instruments, memorabilia,

prints, pictures, class composites, and other items to promote an understanding of veterinary medicine's rich heritage alongside modern, cutting-edge clinical facilities.

Dr. Arrington is happy to share advice and suggestions with other practices interested in displaying historical memorabilia and will compile helpful ideas and hints based on her experience.

2025 SAVMA Symposium

This year's 2025 SAVMA Symposium was held at the University of California Davis School of Veterinary Medicine on March 21-23 with 150 exhibitors and 650 students participating. Dr. Carol McConnell (cmconnell@gmail.com) reports having had a successful experience this year. Because there was little room in the AVMA booth for even a tiny display table, she used her time to best advantage making contacts in the exhibit hall.



In addition, Dr. McConnell attended the Saturday night BBQ and found it to be most enjoyable and productive. At that casual open-air event, she could move freely among the tables to spend time talking with numerous students and handing out bookmarks along with nearly 80 fliers about the essay contest. She told them about the Society, encouraged entering the essay contest, and promoted knowing about the history of their new profession in general. She explains, *"I cannot emphasize enough how effective networking at the Saturday dinner was in obtaining interest in veterinary history."*

Dr. McConnell's recent experience combined with that from Illinois and Tennessee the last several years would suggest this is a useful venue for AVMHS to reach out to prospective veterinarians.

The 2026 SAVMA Symposium will be held next March at North Carolina State University in Raleigh. We are looking for anyone in the region who would like to volunteer for that meeting.

Dr. Jane Hinton Papers to U Penn

AVMHS has been informed that the personal papers of Jane Hinton, VMD (1919-2003), have been acquired for Archives at the University of Pennsylvania, her alma mater. This is a historically significant acquisition

because Dr. Hinton was one of the first two African-American women veterinarians to receive veterinary degrees in 1949. (The other was Alfreda Johnson Webb (1923-1992) from Tuskegee University.)



This collection of Dr. Hinton's memorabilia had recently come up in an auction of 403 lots of "Printed and Manuscript African Americana" (sale 2697) at Swann Auction Galleries in New York City.

On March 20, 2025, her lot was sold for \$25,000 beyond an initial estimate of \$4,000-\$6,000 to an insightful and generous Penn alumnus for donation to University Archives for preservation and research access. It consisted of 1.5 linear feet of hundreds of items related to her childhood, education, and career, including scrapbooks, photos, veterinary licenses, professional articles, the 1949 *Scalpel* yearbook, and other Hawes-Hinton family memorabilia.

AVMHS had been alerted to the forthcoming auction by George Comeau, Esq., President of Canton Historical Society, in Dr. Hinton's hometown of Canton, Massachusetts. In turn, Susanne Whitaker notified Timothy Homing, Public Services Archivist at the University of Pennsylvania. Both had been helpful in compiling her 2022 paper on the two pioneering women veterinarians for *Veterinary Heritage*.

Veterinary Class Composites

AVMHS continues to look for ways we can support preservation of history of the veterinary profession. It has recently come to the attention of the Museum Committee that some veterinary colleges have posted their graduating class composites on their university websites. Because these can be useful for documenting the

development of the profession and for genealogical research, a webpage has been added with links to those sites at <https://www.avmhs.org/class-composites>

The Society encourages all existing veterinary colleges and/or parent institutions to maintain a complete archival file of their composites. It would also be advantageous to post the digital images of those composites for remote access.

But what about the long-gone private veterinary colleges in operation between 1890 to 1925? Many of their class composites have already been lost or are deteriorating. Nevertheless, the Society receives questions from family members seeking photos.



Consequently, the Museum Committee is undertaking an initiative to locate as many as possible of the early class composites that may still be in existence. Such an inventory will determine the status of early private school composites and help with inquiry referrals. In addition, depending on the source, holders could be encouraged to digitize their prints if not already done. The scanned images could be linked or added to a repository for private college composites for further preservation and viewing.

Members who have one or more private college class composites in their personal collections or know of their existence are encouraged to contact chair Dr. Zbig Wojcinski (zwojcinski@gmail.com), Susanne Whitaker (skw2@cornell.edu), or Diane Fagen (dfagen@uic.edu) to help develop this unique resource.

the world. The AVMA will be cohosting the 40th World Veterinary Association Congress in Washington DC on July 18-22.

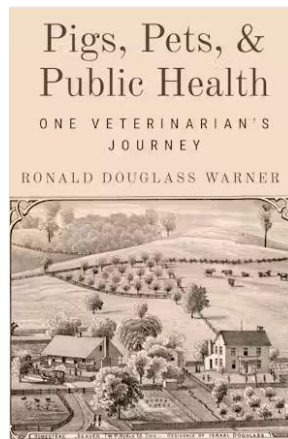

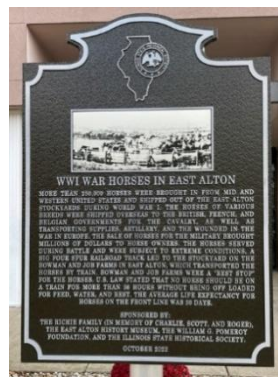

The Society of Phi Zeta Centennial

One hundred years ago on May 4, 1925, a group of senior students and faculty met in James Law Hall at the New York State Veterinary College at Cornell University to found The Society of Phi Zeta, the honorary society for veterinary medicine (<https://www.societyofphizeta.org/>)



Several years after its creation, a second Beta Chapter was petitioned by University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine students in 1929, the same year the Society became a national organization at the AVMA Convention in Detroit. A

Gamma Chapter was added at Iowa State University in 1931, followed by the Delta Chapter at The Ohio State University in 1934. The Society presently has 33 chapters at veterinary colleges in the United States and West Indies.

“The object of the Society is to recognize and promote scholarship and research in matters pertaining to the welfare and diseases of animals.” Student members from junior and senior classes are elected based on scholarship, moral character, and high ideals for professional service.

Odonyms and Toponyms in Quebec

Member Michel Pepin, DMV (veterinet@videotron.ca) has shared the latest issue of *LE VÉTÉRAN: Journal de Société de conservation du patrimoine vétérinaire québécois*, of which he is vice-president of SCPVQ this year. It includes his report of an exhaustive search that found 26 streets, roads, and avenues in Quebec Province named for veterinarians or related to veterinary medicine. Some examples include:

1. Avenue des Vétérinaires at Saint-Hyacinthe
2. Avenue McEachran at Outremont
3. Avenue Rajotte at La Providence
4. Bain Généreux at Montréal
5. Chemin Jacques at Cleveland
6. Parc Victor-Théodule-Daubigny at Montréal
7. Rue Arthur-Décary at Laval
8. Rue Bellavance at Sherbrooke
9. Rue Cherrier et Rue Alfred at Saint-Jérôme
10. Rue Coleman at Gatineau

Brief background on each street name is also included.

In conclusion, Dr. Pepin writes, “in light of this research, we were able to observe that the presence of veterinarians in Quebec's odonyms is more significant than we had anticipated. However, given the significant impact of our profession on Quebec's history, it is up to us to propose

names of equally deserving veterinarians to designate other places in our territory and showcase our heritage.”

Also in the winter issue is a paper by Simon Verge, DMV, with background on the plaque installed in fall 2024 commemorating the founding of the Order of Veterinary Surgeons in Richmond. The April 22, 1902, meeting establishing the College of Veterinarians of the Province of Quebec brought together thirty-four veterinarians for the election of the first ten members of the Board of Governors.

In Memoriam: George W. Beran (1928-2025)



We were saddened to learn of the passing of George W. Beran, DVM, PhD, on January 29, 2025 at age 96. Dr. Beran earned his DVM from Iowa State University (1954) and a PhD later from the University of Kansas (1959). After military service in the Philippines with the US Public Health Service, he taught Veterinary Public Health and Epidemiology at Iowa State for 25 years (1973-1999), where he was twice recognized by his students as an outstanding professor, received the Norden Teaching Award, and was honored with a Distinguished Professorship in Veterinary Medicine (1993).

In addition to his many career contributions and accomplishments in preventive medicine and public health, Dr. Beran harbored interest in history. After retirement, he was an AVMHS member for over 10 years and created the Robert Allen Parker Heritage Room at the Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine.

Opened in October 2001, the room included a collection of more than 2,000 historical books and journals along with instruments, medicines and vaccines, artifacts, early student papers, and audiotapes on veterinary medical history. He also prepared three large exhibits portraying veterinary practice in Iowa in the 1920s, 1950s, and 1980s. A rotating display of 3-generation practices in Iowa showed changes in veterinary practice through photos, instruments, and narratives. The Heritage Room also housed the Drs. George and Janice Beran Center for Veterinary Historical Research.

The Heritage Room is still in existence next to the Veterinary Medicine Library. Exhibits remain largely in place while some items in recent years have been transferred to Special Collections and University Archives in Park Library, including a collection of photographs that have been digitized, personal papers, and some rare books.

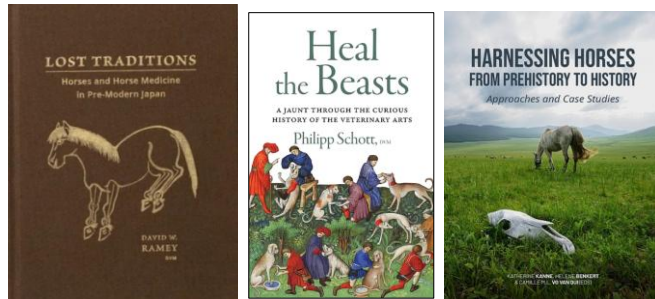

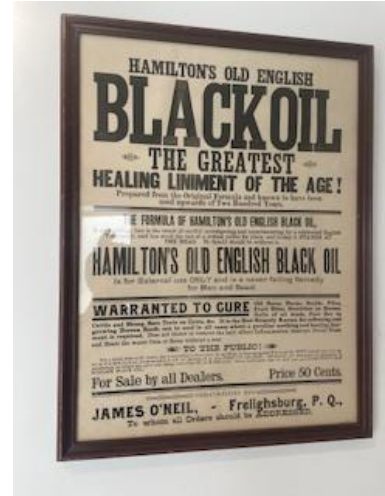
