Named in honor of the Society's founder Dr. J. Fred Smithcors, the annual student history essay contest was established in 1992 and has awarded cash prizes each year for meritorious essays on a broad range of topics related to veterinary history. Students who are enrolled in DVM programs at colleges of veterinary medicine in the United States and Canada are eligible to submit essays of 3500 words or less. Essays are evaluated blindly by a panel of 4 or 5 knowledgeable and experienced judges. Prize winning essays are published in issues of *Veterinary Heritage*, the Society's semi-annual bulletin.

According to Dr. Jessica Garrett, chair of the Essay Contest Committee, "through this contest, students have an exciting opportunity to research topics of their own choosing, gaining a knowledge that may even surpass some of their professors. Learning the history of our field is an amazing way to gain a deeper understanding of our modern medicine, ethical decisions, business practices, and even ongoing research."
